### **APP FEATURES**

- Content delivered in bite-sized videos and audio clips narrated by a buddy.
- Parents work through the eight steps in their own time.
- Can be accessed at any time and any place, reducing barriers to access.
- Downloadable resources and space to record reflections.
- An unguided intervention with no need for clinical support.
- STEPS works on most smartphones, is free and easy to download.

## STEPS USABILITY STUDY

### METHOD

Parents recruited (n=12) Think aloud session #1 =
first impressions.

Use app for one week and complete measures online.

Think aloud session #2 =

#### **RESULTS**

"I'm really very impressed with it. It's a lovely app, it's a brilliant idea." Parent, anonymous



Parents found the app easy to navigate and visually attractive.

94.8 (SD=4.8).

STEPS usability score was

Users liked the simple language
 and the fact that the information
 was easily accessible.

### DISCUSSION

STEPS app could contribute to discussions on:

- Novel ways of delivering support to parents.
- Benefits of providing parenting support via mobile phone apps.
- Providing early support to parents of children with unmet needs.
